Part 2-FIA: Families In Action (FIA) Program is a family systems approach designed to teach parents and teens side by side to strengthen their relationship.

- Projects must be student-led and are available to any youth serving organization with participants ages 6-24.

Public Forum Notice

Department of Justice Investigation of the Chicago Police Department

The United States Department of Justice, Civil Rights Division, and the United States Attorney's Office for the Northern District of Illinois have opened a civil pattern or practice investigation into the Chicago Police Department (CPD) to determine whether there are systemic violations of the Constitution or federal law by the CPD. The investigation is focused on: CPD's use of force, including racial, ethnic and other disparities in its use of force; and CPD's accountability systems, including, how CPD conducts internal investigations, responds to citizen complaints, and handles officer discipline.

As part of its investigation, the Department of Justice and the U.S. Attorney's Office will be hosting four public forums to provide information about its investigative process, advise how community members can contact the DOJ, and offer time for audience members to speak about their experiences with policing in Chicago

Substance Use and Trauma

Policy Challenges and Solutions Webinar

Trauma exposure is common among youth and families experiencing substance use problems, and having both problems leads to greater need and impairment. Given the strong link between trauma and substance use, national policy efforts to address substance use must be trauma informed. This webinar will provide an overview of several national policy challenges and solutions in the area of trauma and substance use.

Experts will highlight recently enacted and pending federal policy proposals to address substance use issues across the lifespan; discuss the substance use policy challenges facing child trauma practitioners assisting children, youth, and families; and discuss the work of the NCTSN and its Trauma and Substance Abuse Collaborative Group to address these important issues. The experiences and policy-relevant recommendations of a family caregiver familiar with substance use issues will also be highlighted.


