Request for Proposals

Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA)

Bullying Prevention Programs

The Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority is requesting proposals for school-based bullying prevention programs.

A maximum of \$25,000 will be awarded to eligible applicants. Only not-for-profit organizations (also including parochial schools, alternative schools, and charter schools) and units of government (including public school districts, parochial schools, alternative schools, and charter schools) with demonstrated capacity to provide school-based bullying prevention programming may apply.

Proposals must be received by 11:59 p.m. on Friday, November 8, 2013.

Only agencies that participated in one of the technical assistance webinars on either October 21 or October 23

are eligible to apply.

After-School Programs

The Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority is requesting proposals for anti-violence-focused after-school programs.

Grants will be awarded to not-for-profit organizations and units of government in at-risk communities to implement evidence-based after-school programming that includes a violence prevention component. Applicants will select and describe proposed implementation of one of the following models:

- Illinois Department of Human Services Teen Reach Model, with added violence prevention activities.
- Illinois State Board of Education 21st Century Model, with added violence prevention activities.
- An evidence-based after-school program that includes violence prevention.

Grant requests of between \$50,000 and \$350,000 will be considered for this programming. Funding will be targeted to communities and schools with risk factors such as high crime, chronic truancy, and mobility rates, and poor attendance and school performance rates.

ICJIA will prioritize applications proposing to serve the following counties, while also considering other locations: Alexander, Boone, Bureau, Champaign, Cook, Franklin, Gallatin, Greene, Hardin, Henry, Jackson, Kane, Kankakee, Lake, Macon, Madison, Marion, Peoria, Pope, Pulaski, Rock Island, Saline, Sangamon, Stephenson, St. Clair, Union, Vermilion, and Winnebago

Proposals must be received by 11:59 p.m. on Friday, November 25, 2013.

ICJIA will hold two technical assistance webinars on this grant program at 2 p.m., November 13 and November 14, 2013. All applicants must participate in a webinar to be eligible for funding.
