Chicago Racial Justice Pooled Fund

This social, economic and political moment is a direct result of the generational disinvestment in Black, Indigenous, and Brown communities. Acknowledging this, the Chicago Racial Justice Pooled Fund (the Fund) is a commitment from thirteen foundations to raise and move \$3M to Chicago organizations building and sustaining movements for justice that center Black lives and address anti-Blackness. In this context, community organizing means bringing people together who individually may lack power but collectively can build and wield power to advance racial justice.



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VOICES OF CHILD HEALTH IN CHICAGO REPORT

Parent-Child Communication about Substance Use

For this [Voices of Child Health in Chicago](#) report, the focus is on parents' communication with their children about substance use. Parents were asked questions about youth substance use as well as questions about their family and their family's health. Report highlights include: 90% of parents report having clear rules about alcohol and drug use for their adolescents, the majority of parents believed they would likely know if their child had engaged in risky substance use behaviors, but youth in other surveys believed their parents were less likely to know about these behaviors; and though most parents discuss substance use rules with their teens, many do not discuss these rules with the parents of their child's friends.
